News From the Library: Rob Melton, Bibliographer for Theatre and Dance, sent word of this special opportunity: "For the month of February, I have arranged for the UCSD Libraries to have free trial access to three new databases from Alexander Street Press. These are: *American Film Scripts Online, Audio Drama: The L.A. Theatre Works Collection,* and *Twentieth Century North American Drama. American Film Scripts* contains 1,009 scripts by 1,062 writers together with detailed, fielded information on the scenes, characters and people related to the scripts. In addition, the database includes

facsimile images for more than 500 of these screenplays. Most of the scripts have never been published before, and nowhere else are they available online. *Audio Drama* includes more than 300 important dramatic works in streaming audio from the curated archive of the nation's premiere radio theatre company, *L.A. Theatre Works*. *Twentieth Century North American Drama* contains 1,530 plays by 223 playwrights, together with detailed, fielded information on related productions, theaters, production companies, and more. The database also includes selected playbills, production photographs and other ephemera related to the plays. More than 150 of the plays are published for the first time, including a number by major authors. To access these databases (along with all other Alexander Street Press databases that the Libraries have already purchased, e.g. Theatre in Video, North American Theatre Online), go to http://alexanderstreet.com/products/all.htm. 


DEPARTMENT NEWS

Opening This Week – <u>The Seagull</u>, directed by **Tom Dugdale**. In the Mandell Weiss Forum Theatre, February $18^{th} - 27^{th}$.

Born in Russia in 1860, Anton Chekhov was both a writer and a doctor. Renowned during his lifetime for his humorous sketches and stories, Chekhov is best known today for his four great plays - *The Seagull, Uncle Vanya, Three Sisters*, and *The Cherry Orchard*. It has been said that Chekhov banished melodrama from the stage, installing in its place, as Paul Schmidt puts it, "the silences of missed opportunity, the nonsense phrase that suddenly seems laden with meaning." Chekhov remained active and industrious throughout his life, despite increasingly frequent episodes of poor health, brought on by tuberculosis. He died in the spring of 1904.

<u>Marriage, Medicine, Money, and Mayhem: French Farces by Molière and</u>
<u>Feydeau</u>, directed by **Jim Carmody, Heather Ramey & Laura Brueckner.**Translated by Jim Carmody. February 24th – 27th.

Doctor For A Day -Widely acknowledged the greatest comic actor and *farceur* of his time, **Molière** (1622-1673) wrote the most enduring comic dramas of 17th century. His plays range over every genre from vulgar farce to the most refined poetic comedy of manners (frequently in the same play) and are celebrated for their satirical treatment of characters afflicted by pretentiousness, consumed by greed, and deformed by moral and religious hypocrisy. Again and again, his plays explore the flaws and pains of the institution of marriage: the anguish of arranged marriages, the daily violence of couples who cannot or will not collaborate or communicate with each other. Molière's own marriage was famously troubled and

a staple of everyday gossip. Deeply informed by the Italian *commedia dell'arte* (Molière shared a theatre with an Italian *commedia* troupe), *Doctor for a Day* combines a troubled, violent marriage with a farcical satire of doctors and medicine and a romantic rescue of a young girl resisting an arranged marriage. *Baby Can't Go Potty - Georges Feydeau* (1862-1921) began writing plays to avoid doing schoolwork and became the most provocative and successful French comic playwright since Molière. Feydeau's intricately plotted plays serve up detailed and merciless portrayals of Parisian life at the turn of the century: the hapless husband, the termagant wife, the glittering society couple, and their lovers on the side, all accompanied by a parade of rapacious merchants, lusty doctors, unheroic soldiers, and bewildered tourists. Feydeau renders his characters and the increasingly bizarre events that confound them through razor-sharp dialogue and increasingly out-of-control behavior, creating a theatre that skewers the social pretentions and slippery ethics of Belle Epoque society. According to Feydeau's son Jacques, *Baby Can't Go Potty* is a fairly accurate description of an episode from their family life.
