

This week two Department shows begin tech. UCSD is proud to present the San Diego premiere of Anne Washburn's MR. BURNS, A POST ELECTRIC PLAY, directed by Jack Reuler, who is the Quinn Martin Guest Director this semester. Jack Reuler founded the Mixed Blood Theatre Company at the age of 22 and has served as its Artistic Director for 38 years. Mixed Blood is dedicated to the spirit of Dr. King's dream, promoting successful pluralism using theatre as a vehicle for artistry, entertainment, education, and effecting social change. To that end he has produced and directed 147 world premieres

and hundreds of comedies, musicals, extravaganzas, and chamber theatre pieces.

MR. BURNS asks what will endure when the cataclysm arrives- when the grid fails, society crumbles, and we're faced with the task of rebuilding? This dark comedy propels us forward nearly a century, following a new civilization stumbling into its future. Paying homage to live theater, and to the resilience of Bart Simpson through the ages, MR BURNS is an animated exploration of how the pop culture of one era might evolve into the mythology of another. 

MR. BURNS, A POST ELECTRIC PLAY

Also beginning tech this week is the undergraduate production of Christopher Durang's THE MARRIAGE OF BETTE AND BOO directed by Professor Kim Walsh. Kim Walsh has been acting, directing and teaching theatre throughout the country and abroad for over twenty years. A UCSD acting alum (MFA '92), Kim has appeared in film, television and regional theatres including the Signature Theatre, the Ernie Martin Studio Theatre and locally at La Jolla Playhouse where she



was in the original productions of *Fortinbras*, by Lee Blessing, and the musical *Elmer Gantry*, directed by Des McAnuff. She was a member of the Elysium Theater Company in New York, where she performed in classic and existential German plays including *Hinkemann*, *Fun and Games* at the Barbershop and *Offending the Audience*. She directed Theatre Workshop for Kaiser Permanente, a program for abused women suffering obesity. She has taught from South East Los Angeles to Lugano, Switzerland, as well as the Old Globe, La Jolla Playhouse and at UC San Diego, where she has been teaching Acting for the last 12 years.

The Marriage of Bette and Boo is Christopher Durang's most autobiographical play. It examines an American mainstay - the dysfunctional family - with Durang's uniquely wonderful

dark humor. It begins with the happy wedding celebration of the title characters, who navigate through disappointment and loss, and, despite their best intentions, become unhinged and lost. Kim writes: I find the play relevant today, 30 years after its premiere, as it depicts human beings as they pursue love and fail miserably, with unrelenting courage and huge forgiveness.

Becky Petitt Named UCSD's Vice Chancellor for Equity, Diversity and Inclusion



Following a comprehensive nationwide search, the University of California, San Diego announces the appointment of Becky Petitt as Vice Chancellor for Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (VC-EDI), effective March 23, 2015. She will serve as the lead senior executive responsible for providing a holistic and integrated vision on all major equity, diversity and inclusion efforts. Petitt brings to UC San Diego 24 years of progressive leadership

experience in diversity work across the university community, most recently at Texas A&M University as Associate Vice President for Diversity.

"We are delighted to announce the appointment of Dr. Becky Petitt as UC San Diego's next Vice Chancellor for Equity, Diversity and Inclusion," said Chancellor Pradeep K. Khosla. "She has a strong record of achievement as a visionary leader, guiding campus constituents in a collaborative and cohesive effort to achieve a climate of equity, diversity and inclusion. We look forward to her leadership in our initiatives to ensure that UC San Diego is a welcoming, diverse and

inclusive campus community."

Cyber Attack on Anthem (UCSD Health Network Provider)

As many of you have heard in the news, Anthem, Inc. disclosed today (Feb. 5, 2015) that the health insurer was the target of a very sophisticated external cyber attack and that data for its 80 million members was accessed. This potentially includes information about UC students, faculty, staff and retirees, as well as their dependents.

Currently, Anthem is the network provider and claims administrator for UC SHIP, the university's student health insurance plan, at UC San Diego. In addition, from 2003 until Jan. 1, 2014, Anthem provided health insurance to certain UC employees and retirees and their dependents.

According to Anthem, the information accessed through the attack includes member names, member health ID numbers/Social Security numbers (Anthem does not possess Social Security numbers for UC students), dates of birth, addresses, telephone numbers, email addresses, and employment information such as the UC campus or medical center location and the separation date.

Anthem has created a dedicated website where current and former Anthem members can find information. Members may also call 1-877-263-7995.

Editor's note: On Feb. 6, Anthem notified UC of a phishing scam related to the cyber attack. The phishing scam, which uses Anthem's logo, includes an offer to sign up for a year of credit card protection. If you receive this or a similar email, do not respond to or click on any links. Anthem is not calling or emailing members.

New Bike Paths Around Campus



A popular pathway is about to get a makeover as part of UC San Diego's efforts to create a more bicycle-friendly campus. Peterson Hill, located between Peterson Hall, the Cognitive Science Building and the Faculty Club is undergoing extensive improvements that will transform the way bicyclists and pedestrians access the busy area.

"UC San Diego was originally planned for cars, not bikes," said Gary C. Matthews, vice chancellor of Resource Management and Planning. "But with our goal of becoming a carbon-neutral campus by 2025, we need to proactively address the challenges of becoming a more bicycle-friendly campus. This project is just one of many steps we're taking in that direction."

Construction on the University Center Bike and Pedestrian Improvements project began this week and is expected to be completed in summer 2015. The project - which was developed with extensive student input and support - will replace an existing steep, shared-use path with separate pedestrian and bicycle paths and create a new ADA accessible route from Peterson Hall to Geisel Library. Pedestrians will be able to use a new concrete walk with a series of staircases on Peterson Hill, while bicycle riders will be able to use the designated bike paths. A ramp will be available for all wheeled and disabled users.

In addition to the Peterson Hill improvements, a second dedicated bike path will also be installed to run through the Park Eucalyptus Grove, west of the Student Health Center. Called the Grove Path Connection, the route will parallel Library Walk and enhance bicycle connection with Peterson Hill. Once the Grove Path is open, bicycle riders will have an alternative to pedestrian-only Library Walk, where they are required to dismount.

"These improvements are going to make a tremendous difference," said campus landscape architect Todd Pitman of Physical and Community Planning. "Peterson Hill is a very high-traffic area with up to 1,200 people passing through on a daily basis. Once construction is completed, everyone who travels through the area will benefit."

In addition to the new paths, improvements will also include adding signage and lighting as well as installing improved drainage. There will also be significant re-forestation done within the campus's iconic eucalyptus grove.


"We're planting two trees for every one tree we have to remove," said Pitman. "The new trees will be much healthier and will ensure the eucalyptus grove continues to thrive for years to come."

Acting alum **KJ Sanchez** (MFA 92)'s new collaboration with Jenny Merecin X's and O's (A FOOTBALL LOVE STORY) was recently featured in the NY Times. The Times writes "The dialogue of the football-playing characters has been plucked verbatim from interviews with former players, including Mr. Mercein. The dialogue of other characters - wives, children, doctors, soldiers, fans - were heavily influenced by interviews. Ms. Mercein and Ms. Sanchez, who wrote the script, conducted more than 50 interviews, and said that telling the story in the words of former players allowed for a truer portrait.

'I have no interest in my own opinions or agenda, and I don't have any interest in agitprop theater,' Ms. Sanchez said. 'The documentary process is really a great way for me to work as a photographer rather than a novelist.'" <u>Click here</u> for the full article.
